

"BUSINESS AS USUAL"
AT BART

JERROLD HALL - 1992 - Shot in the back of the head with a shotgun while walking away from a BART cop.

ROBERT GREER - 1997 - "Falls to his death", after being arrested and while in custody of BART police.

BRUCE SEWARD - 2000 - Shot to death while naked, unarmed, and having a nervous breakdown.

LAWSUIT - 2001 - Subpoenaed BART police records indicate black riders make up 60% of arrests, but only 7% of ridership. BART takes no action.

KEN CARRETHERS - 2008 - Beaten by officer Johannes Mehserle.

OSCAR GRANT - 2009 - Fatally shot in the back by Johannes Mehserle while restrained and lying face down.

FRED COLLINS - 2010 - Shot dead while backing AWAY from officers. They claim he was armed. Witnesses disagree that he was a threat.

13-YEAR-OLD BOY - 2010 - BART sergeant in charge of taser training shoots taser out of the window of his car at a boy riding his bicycle.

16-YEAR-OLD - 2010 - Tortured by taser while handcuffed in the back of a BART police cruiser.

CHARLES HILL - 2011 - Unarmed "wobbly drunk" who could barely stand up was accosted by two BART police and gunned down.

NUBIA BOWE-2014- Arrested and beaten up by BART police. She was held in jail on false charges and is suing.
